Breaking the Glass Armor Kristin Thompson 2020-05-05 "Classical works have for us become covered with the glassy armor of familiarity," wrote Victor Shklovsky in 1914. Here Kristin Thompson "defamiliarizes" the reader with eleven different films. Other chapters deal with Tati's *Les Vacances de Monsieur Hulot* and *Play Time* and Godard's *Tout va bien* and *Sauve qui peut (la vie)*. Although neoformalist analysis is a rigorous, distinctive approach, it avoids extensive specialized vocabulary and esoteric concepts: the essays here can be read separately

by those interested in the individual films. The book's overall purpose, however, goes beyond making these particular films more accessible and intriguing to propose new ways of looking at cinema as a whole.
